We are planning the next stages and setting priorities—some of which get altered by developments beyond our control.


We genuinely thank Frederick "Buck" Thornburg '63 for his continued financial support for the Lortz Library. His generos-

Brother Hixon '49 Authors Book On Guadalcanal

Carl K. Hixon '49 authored a compelling book on the battle for Guadalcanal during World War II. The book, *Guadalcanal: An American Story*, is published by the U.S. Naval Institute Press.

The Associated Press calls it one of the two best books on Guadalcanal, according to Brother Hixon. He describes the book as a unique report from the perspective of “underdogs, a hastily assembled division of Marines, mostly 19-year-old” pimply kids unceremoniously deposited on a “devilishly hot, jungle, malarial island” in the Solomons by the Navy and then abandoned after the Navy lost a major naval battle to the Japanese.

The book draws on extensive research of the battle's after-action reports, includ-


ing those prepared by Brother Hixon. The Marines found themselves fighting a series of “cliff-hanging, Banzai-screaming battles with an undefeated Japanese Imperial Army.” But, the Marines did not give up. Brother Hixon's style is informal and factual. It is full of color, anecdotes, “Jarhead jargon,” and salty Marine culture. The “Jarhead jargon” and “salty Marine culture” are easily identifiable, but consult a Marine or Brother Hixon for explanations if you can't figure out the meaning!

Brother Hixon served as president of Lambda Chapter in 1948 and 1949. He describes Lambda during these years as a

wonderfully mixed bag of 17- and 18-year-old kids, Purple Heart Marines, former Air Force Lt. Colonels, 101 Airborne veterans and married Fijis living out who learned lots from each other. His father, also Carl K. Hixon, was a Lambda Fiji, class of 1918.

Brother Hixon now makes his home at: 481 Homestead Dr., Apt. 1, LaGrange Park, IL 60526. He is an active member of the Guadalcanal Campaign Veterans Association. He is currently working on two novels, one about the Merchant Marine in World War II and the other about the triumphal revolt of our bird and animal life against human ecological despoilers.

Visit your local bookstore for a copy of *Guadalcanal: An American Story*. You won't be disappointed. It is a unique and fascinating reading, even if history is not your favorite subject!



Brother Appointed VP and Dean at Oceanographic Institution

James Yoder '70 has been elected vice president for academic programs and dean at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution (WHOI).

He assumed his new duties November 28, 2005. WHOI is a private, independent marine research, engineering, and higher education organization located in Falmouth, Massachusetts. It grants graduate degrees in oceanography, applied ocean science, and engineering and through a joint program with the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Jim is a highly regarded and well-known biological oceanographer—having served as a researcher, professor, and associate dean at the University of Rhode Island Graduate School of Oceanography. He also served as director of the division of ocean sciences at

the National Science Foundation (NSF) in Washington, D.C. from 2001- 2004.

While with the NSF, he oversaw the peer-review process for funding and support for U.S. academic and non-profit institutions for research in biological, chemical, and physical oceanography, marine geology and geophysics, and ocean science education.

He also worked as a program manager in the ocean branch at NASA headquarters and was a visiting senior scientist at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. He joined the graduate school of oceanography faculty at the University of Rhode Island in 1989, becoming a professor in 1992 and associate dean in 1993. He is

a member of numerous national and international committees and panels on oceanographic research.

In his new position at WHOI, Jim will be responsible for the institution's formal and informal education programs and activities, including the postdoctoral program, the graduate program, undergraduate summer programs, and K-12 activities.

Jim received his BA in botany from DePauw in 1970 and MS and PhD degrees in oceanography from the University of Rhode Island in 1974 and 1979, respectively.

Ryan Barton '08 is leading an effort to revitalize downtown Rushville, Indiana, his hometown, through historic preservation. The Rushville City Council and Mayor Bob Bridges are encouraging Barton with grant assistance advice and appointing him to the Heart of Rushville Board.

Ryan is particularly interested in his-

tory and architecture. According to Barton, "New buildings are glass and brick front, and older structures are just so much more involved. Construction now doesn't have marble columns and designed facades characteristic of certain eras in history." He is especially interested in restoring Melodeon Hall in Rushville, built in 1872.

Ryan says Melodeon Hall was the best Broadway-style theatre in Indiana

and among the top in the nation. It had 500 seats, was built with then-modern amenities like gas lighting and velvet seating—features that did not become common until the early 1900s. Melodeon Hall is on the National Historical Registrar of Historical Places.
