## Projesh Banerjea '08 Receives Jack Kent Cooke Scholarship

Projesh Banerjea '08 is the recipient of a 2009 graduate scholarship from the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation. Projesh is using the award to pursue a graduate degree in economic history at the London School of Economics. Recipients of the highly competitive awards are chosen from a national pool with over 1,000 nominees competing for the 29 awards this year.

Projesh was born in India, and at an early age moved with his family to Liberia where his father had been transferred. He was in Liberia a short time when civil war broke out. His family's home was looted and razed, and he barely escaped back to India, where his family settled in Calcutta. An experience that had a powerful impact on Projesh was attending school for ten years across the street from Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity. He organized food drives for the mission through his high school, learning then that there was something truly noble about helping a fellow human being "and that I wanted service always to be a part of my life.'

While in high school, Projesh immersed himself in various extracurricular activities music, debate, theater, and sports, eventually winning the Shaw Education Foundation award for the Best All-Round Student in Calcutta. At DePauw, he continued his involvement with the debate and forensics team, university orchestra, served as business and advertising manager of The DePauw student newspaper among other extracurricular activities. He was also a Management Fellow and Information Technology Associate (ITAP). In 2008, he received The Wall Street Journal Student Achievement Award and the Frank T. Carlton Award for Economics, the Robert O. Weiss Debate and Public Speaking Award and graduated Phi Beta Kappa, among others. (Check the DePauw website and search for Projesh Banerjea for more!)

At DePauw, Projesh quickly distinguished himself as both a brilliant student and a kindhearted friend to all. One of his professors at DePauw called him a "visionary student of economics." While at DePauw in 2006, Projesh was selected to attend an intensive nine-week program at Duke University

## **President's Report For Tiger FIJI**

As I write, officer elections are swiftly approaching at Lambda. By the time this issue of Tiger FIJI is distributed, my fellow cabinet members and I will have passed the reins to the next group of FIJI officers, and I couldn't be more confident that they will continue to promote the values and programs that have made us successful over the past years. First and foremost, this is thanks to our dedicated efforts at recruiting men who not only share our values, but who also bring their own unique perspectives and ideas to the chapter. We welcomed 21 new brothers last April, and they have already made lasting contributions, taking an active role in leadership positions and the life of the chapter.

This fall, we held our two traditional philanthropy events: Bark-B-Que, an allcampus cookout co-hosted with Kappa Alpha Theta to benefit the Putnam County Humane Society; and Pumpkin Bash, expanded this year to a two-day event including games and a Pumpkin Queen competition among sororities, all benefiting the American Red Cross. 
As Rob became more interested in radio, he moved out of the Lambda house in the second semester junior year to spend time as an intern in Washington, D.C.

## Struggling Economy Births FIJI Dance Band

I'm not sure when there was last a Lambda FIJI house band. Maybe never. If there ever was one, I doubt I would be able to verify it, save the assurance of alumni. It's not the sort of effort that ends up as a plaque on a wall or documented in the archives. At best, the band would be a memory in minds of a few people; individuals who found something worth remembering in the short-lived excitement.

This article, however, is here to verify the emergence of a Lambda FIII house band in the fall of 2009. The quintet, simply named "FIJI Dance Band," consists of Cameron Gindap '10 on vocals, Matt Brauer '11 on guitar, Andrew "Mad Dog" Maddocks '11 on viola, Matt Cecil '12 on bass, and yours truly, Gerard Pannekoek '11, on drums. The band played at FIJI's last two major social events, FIJI Office Party and FIJI Fest, covering danceable pop and rock hits that ranged from Weezer's "Say It Ain't So" to Kanye West's "Homecoming."

While the band performs primarily to make people dance, personal enjoyment also serves as motivation. "The ladies dig my groovy bass playing," said Brother Cecil, and all the evidence proves this statement to be true. Brother Gindap said



singing for the band was "really fun" and that he "liked doing it a lot." Personally, I love providing the beats that get people moving on the dance floor. It's a feeling that never gets old.

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sponsored by the American Economic Association, taking graduate-level courses in economics. There, he honed his knowledge of the mathematics of economics. Projesh says that Raymonda Burgman, associate professor of economics at DePauw, is an inspiration because she "had a way of bridging the gap between academia and the real world and made me see economics not just as a subject to be studied but as a way of life."

In 2007, he was an intern with the technology, media and telecommunications investment banking group at J.P. Morgan in New York. Upon graduating from DePauw, he joined J.P. Morgan as a financial analyst for the investment-banking group.

Projesh's contemporaries at Lambda will attest to his commitment to service. He organized international dinners at Lambda for the brothers, international students, and others. He was active in philanthropy and social service projects during his student years, always "giving back" to the community whenever and wherever he had the opportunity. While in New York, he tutored survivors of domestic violence in English, helped paint a Manhattan shelter, and cotranslated English documents into Bengali for new immigrants. And, he once took a week off from work to volunteer as an apprentice at a French pastry shop!

Projesh plans to pursue a Ph.D. in developmental economics. His ultimate goal is to develop economic policies that focus on education, domestic industry, as well as rural and urban infrastructure development. He says that "After working in the financial services sector this year [2008–2009], I understand how important it is to study history and analyze why certain decisions were made in the past and whether they should or should not be altered. I have learned that history does, indeed, repeat itself and that the four most expensive words in the world are perhaps 'this time it's different."
