Lambda Chapter's positive momentum continues to build. A new cabinet has taken office, new strength in our BCA is appearing, and the house corporation (HC) is taking on the challenges of refurbishing the chapter house-still beautiful after 45 years of life, but in substantial need of a renewed infrastructure. We can proudly report to alumni that Lambda is truly one of the strongest houses on campus. We take pride in stating that the chapter truly deserves the support of our Graduate Brothers.

Momentum continues through changes ...

Lambda's outgoing cabinet led the chapter-with enthusiastic support from the members—to continue its outstanding scholarship (boasting a 3.22 GPA this past spring semester) and its campus leadership in publications, student organizations, sustainability issues, and both Greek and university relations. New levels of accomplishment included an innovation in the chapter's approach to philanthropy, establishing a new endowed fund to perpetuate the chapter's annual giving functions.

As Phil Heyde '72 reported his retirement as house corporation president in the last Tiger FIII, Kit Lortz '62 and Doug Mitchell '70 stepped in as interim co-presidents. Phil continues to enthusiastically support the undergrads and continues as a HC member.

Peter Fellegy, an undergraduate's parent who initiated in '05 and is a new EC member, coordinated the complete restoration of the 45year old second-floor bathrooms, a nearly \$100,000 investment that was sorely needed and which will soon need to be replicated on the third floor. In the near future, the HC will more fully describe further restoration and improvement projects that will preserve the long-term viability of Lambda's chapter house.

Eric Wolfe '04, our Purple Legionnaire, recently accepted employment as a Greek life coordinator at DePauw-a compliment to Lambda's capability to provide talented

resources to the university—which required his resignation as Purple Legionnaire. We eagerly look forward to his replacement and thank Eric for his service to Lambda.

During a given semester, anywhere from five to 10 brothers voluntarily give up their Saturday mornings to serve as coaches and mentors to young athletes in Greencastle. Students in the North Shore area of Chicago are now more conscientious of their actions around their classmates, thanks to one Lambda

Graduate Brother—Rob Johnson '90. Rob was recently awarded the Outstanding Advocate Award by the Northern Suburban Special Education District (NSSED) Foundation. Brother Johnson won the award for his outreach programs in several schools in the North Shore area of Chicago.
