Lambda Marks Its 150th with Three Days of Celebrations

Lambda Chapter celebrated its 150th anniversary—making it the oldest Phi Gamma Delta chapter in continuous existence and the second-oldest fraternity at DePauw—with a blow out party, held September 22-24, 2006, in Indianapolis and Greencastle.

Over 250 graduate brothers, spouses, faculty members, university staff, and guests attended the various events. Classes from 1947 to 2006 were represented. Attendees included brothers from Montana, California, Florida, New York, Washington, D.C., and more.

Archon Vice President Bill Miller (Indiana) attended the Friday reception, which featured lots of opportunities to see friends and meet new ones! The memorabilia display was superb, as was the Beta Graduate Chapter Chorus.

DePauw University President Robert G. Bottoms spoke at the chapter house on September 23. In his remarks, Dr. Bottoms recognized the accomplishments of the chapter and its strong graduate support, especially since the “revitalization” effort started in 2000. Dr. Bottoms remarked that, “Fiji has done some unbelievable things. I have a personal appreciation for what it has been able to achieve.” He also commented on his own fraternity experience and how “fraternity life at its best changes lives forever.”

James Lincoln, vice president for Student Services, spoke at the Gala Dinner. His remarks focused on the achievements of Phi Gam, especially scholarship, diversity, philanthropy, and social service.

He also shared anecdotes about the chapter, such as the time former House Corporation President Paul Qua '82 entered the house smoking a cigar—a violation of the chapter’s no-smoking policy—and was asked to step outside or pay a \$25 fine! Paul stepped outside. Undergraduate brothers later commented that they did not know Lincoln knew so much about Phi Gam. Well, he does, and he received a standing ovation in appreciation!

Chapter President Brian Furman '08 spoke about the status of the chapter today and its plans for the future. (See his remarks on page two.)

William A. Martin III (Mississippi State '75) spoke about the fraternity and challenges fraternities face today. He commented on the success at Lambda and how it serves as an example for other chapters and fraternities.

The highlight of the evening was the keynote address by Towner Blackstock (Davidson '94), curator of the Phi Gamma Delta Archives. (Yes, the DePauw football stadium bears the same name, and he wants it back! Towner, the son of a Beta, is also a member of the Sons of Betas or “SOBs!” Rivalries are great!)

After reviewing the early history of Lambda, and the many contributions Lambda graduates have made to their nation, state, alma mater, and fraternity, Towner issued challenges to the chapter for continued improvement, encouraging them not to rest on their laurels. He asked that the chapter apply for fraternity awards, using award criteria as a measure of excellence—not just at DePauw but amongst all

chapters. These awards and criteria are a “springboard for constant improvement, reinforced through support of graduates.”

Challenges were also issued to graduate brothers to get involved with the university, the chapter, the fraternity, and its values. “Whether you support academic and educational aims through the foundation or help perpetuate our mission of brotherhood, be assured every bit helps.”

“More than anything, we need your time, your presence at functions, your counsel at chapter meetings” or by helping a young man find direction in the chapter or in life. “I ask you not only to get involved. I ask you to actively support our values.”

“We can only ask you to stand for Phi Gamma Delta if you believe in what Phi, Gamma, Delta means.”

This celebration is a testament to the dedication of Lambda brothers like you for the last century and a half! It is also a celebration of how far the chapter has come since 2000 and to the quality of the undergraduate chapter today. Special recognition is due to the many graduate brothers who supported the revitalization effort. Your support and hard work made this celebration a reality. The undergraduates will not let this happen again!

To the archons and international fraternity staff that approved the revitalization plan and committed the resources to make it a reality, we are sincerely appreciative. To our brothers at other Fiji chapters in Indiana, we are grateful for your substantial contributions to the revitalization effort—especially helping with recruitment in the early stages.

Today is an exciting time to be a Lambda Fijii. The chapter is thriving and at its highest point in years. Okay, I may sound like we have the confidence of a poker player holding four aces, but we have reasons for being confident about our future. During recruitment last year, we pledged and initiated 12 men of exceptionally high quality. They are intelligent, industrious, enthusiastic, and represent the values of Phi Gamma Delta. We seek members that bring quality to the chapter and who are multitalented.

The chapter has strong pledge-education and member-education programs. We emphasize these programs on an on-going basis. These include programs in the Purple Pilgrim, risk management, and alcohol use. We are committed to assisting each of our brothers learn and grow as individuals and as a chapter.

Scholarship is taken very seriously at Lambda. For four straight years, the chapter finished well above the all-men and all-fraternity averages—something that is now our expectation and our contribution to Lambda's history of excellence. Our last two pledge classes finished first among all fraternity pledge classes. For the past two semesters, Lambda finished first with the highest GPA among all fraternities. Last fall's GPA of 3.4117 was the highest of all Fiji chapters in Indiana and third highest among Fiji chapters nationally. We improved second semester with a chapter GPA of 3.4291.

Brother Buck Thornburg asked, "Don't the undergraduates do anything but study?" We do lots more than study! We have a very active social life!

Our campus involvement is very high. Many brothers are members of scholastic

and honorary societies, philanthropic scholarship programs, science research fellows, and media fellows. We are active in a variety of clubs, campus organizations, theatre, music, work-study programs, political clubs, RAs in residence halls, Operation Life, debate, and forensics, and more. Continuing a Lambda tradition, we have brothers actively involved with *The DePauw* newspaper, with some having key positions. Dan Kelley '05 was editor in chief spring semester 2005, and Projesh Banerjea '08 is the current business manager.

Brothers participate in internship programs and study-abroad programs. Brothers are DePauw fall admissions officers and computer interns.

The chapter emphasizes philanthropy and social service projects. Each undergraduate contributes 15 hours a month to social service and many exceed this amount.

We are recognized as a chapter by awards from Greek Affairs and at Fiji State Day. We finished third in the Beta Cup competition as best overall chapter in Indiana.

Our graduate support is very strong and getting better. Our BCA and house corporation are actively involved with the chapter. The house corporation has been instrumental in making improvements to the house—including resolving water problems in the basement, new landscaping and a new patio, new furniture, and a multitude of other repairs. More are in progress and more are planned. For the past two summers, graduate brothers have returned to make repairs to the house. They paint, clean, repair items, remodeled the ladies powder room, and much more. We appreciate their time and efforts because it makes our house look good! We do our part, too. Every brother has a house job.

With a successful recruitment this year, there are no limits to what the chapter can achieve. We plan on getting better and better. We look forward to our continued growth and prosperity. Proud to be a Fijii!

Distinguished Lambda Graduates Honored

On September 23, during Lambda Chapter's 150th Anniversary Celebration, Bernard C. Kilgore '29, Edwin C. Boswell '31, J. Stanford Smith '36, and Douglas A. Smith '68, were inducted as Distinguished Lambda Graduates. Kilgore, Boswell, and Stan Smith were inducted Ad Astra. Lalla Boswell Heyde and her husband, James, accepted for Brother Ed Boswell. Over 130 brothers, spouses, and guests attended the program at the chapter house.

EDWIN C. BOSWELL

Brother Boswell was a rector scholar at DePauw during the Great Depression. This influenced Ed and his wife, Reba, for the rest of their lives. He frequently hired Fiji undergraduates and other DePauw students for summer employment to assist financing their DePauw educations. Ed and Reba also endowed the McMahan Scholarship for Women, the Old Gold Scholarship for deserving scholar athletes, and, along with James Thornburg '33, the Fiji Merit Scholarship Fund at DePauw.

Ed literally changed the landscape of the campus. He marshaled the resources of his construction company to develop tennis facilities, two intramural fields, a varsity practice field, and the Boswell Soccer Field. He also chaired the drive for construction of the Lilly Center. He served as a member of the DePauw Board of Trustees for more than 25 years.

In her acceptance remarks, Lalla Boswell Heyde, commented, "My father loved Fiji and frequently visited the chapter for many years. He felt that his greatest achievement was to be able to give the same opportunity to young people."

BERNARD C. KILGORE

Barney, as he was known to all, began his meteoric rise at The Wall Street Journal shortly after graduating from DePauw. In 1941, he became the youngest ever vice president-general manager of The Journal. At age 36, he was named publisher and president of Dow Jones and Co. He was named chairman of the board in 1966.

Barney was a visionary who trans-

formed The Journal from a New York trade publication into the nation's largest newspaper, with a circulation of over 2 million. His management style was unpretentious. He roamed the halls in shirt sleeves and loosened tie. He made it a practice to visit department heads to make suggestions. Direct orders were rare.

Barney served as a member of the DePauw Board of Trustees from 1954 until his death in 1967. He was elected chairman of the board in 1965 and was beginning his second term at the time of his death. Peter Kann, later chairman of Dow Jones, wrote Barney "was truly a modest man. The Journal's eulogy said that even after a quarter-century at the top of his profession, his work is more famous than himself. Barney Kilgore liked it that way."

J. STANFORD SMITH

Stan Smith also entered DePauw as a rector scholar during the Great Depression. He supported himself by selling flowers from his family's farm in Terre Haute. Later in life, when asked what his greatest challenge at DePauw was, he replied, "Being treasurer of the Phi Gamma Delta house during the depression." He loved music, but according to his wife, Elaine, could not carry a tune. He wanted to be an opera singer "in his next life."

After graduating in 1936, Brother Stan was recruited by General Electric Co. He wasn't, however, receiving his paychecks since the company had another employee also named John Jacob Smith. Brother Stan held a contest to change his name. Thereafter, he became known as J. Stanford Smith!

He served General Electric in management positions until being named chairman and CEO of International Paper in 1973. After his retirement, he taught business ethics at Cornell University and served on the board of directors for Chase Manhattan Bank, Eli Lilly and Co., and General Motors. He was also a longtime trustee of DePauw and was elected chairman in 1980.

Among his proudest accomplishments is his early support for the civil rights and women's movements. He provided opportunities for minorities in science, engineering, and business. He encouraged his daughter, Barbara, to earn her

MBA at NYU, which led to her successful career in marketing.

DOUGLAS A. SMITH

Doug Smith is number 37 of 48 members of his family to attend DePauw. Like his father, Stan, he found a home at Phi Gam. While at DePauw, Doug was on "a journey to find himself" and he did! His greatest interests remain life-span development for personal growth, leadership, organizational effectiveness, and successful living. He taught a winter term course at DePauw, "In Pursuit of Happiness," which he described as "one of the highlights of my life."

Doug is currently chairman of Value Creation Partners and Best Brands Corporation. He founded Value Creation Partners, which subsequently acquired Best Brands and International Multifoods in 2005. The companies have revenues of over \$400 million dollars, with facilities throughout the United States and Canada. Previously, he was chairman and CEO of Borden Foods.

He remains involved as an alumnus, having been a Management Center speaker, former member of the Public Relations Council, and currently a member of the Management Center Advisory Council and chair of the McDermond Advisory Board.

Doug and his wife, Phyllis, make their home in Columbus, Ohio, and have two grown sons. Both are actively involved with the national steering committee of the Leukemia Lymphoma Society. Doug is currently undergoing treatment for Leukemia but still finds time for his business activities, his involvement with

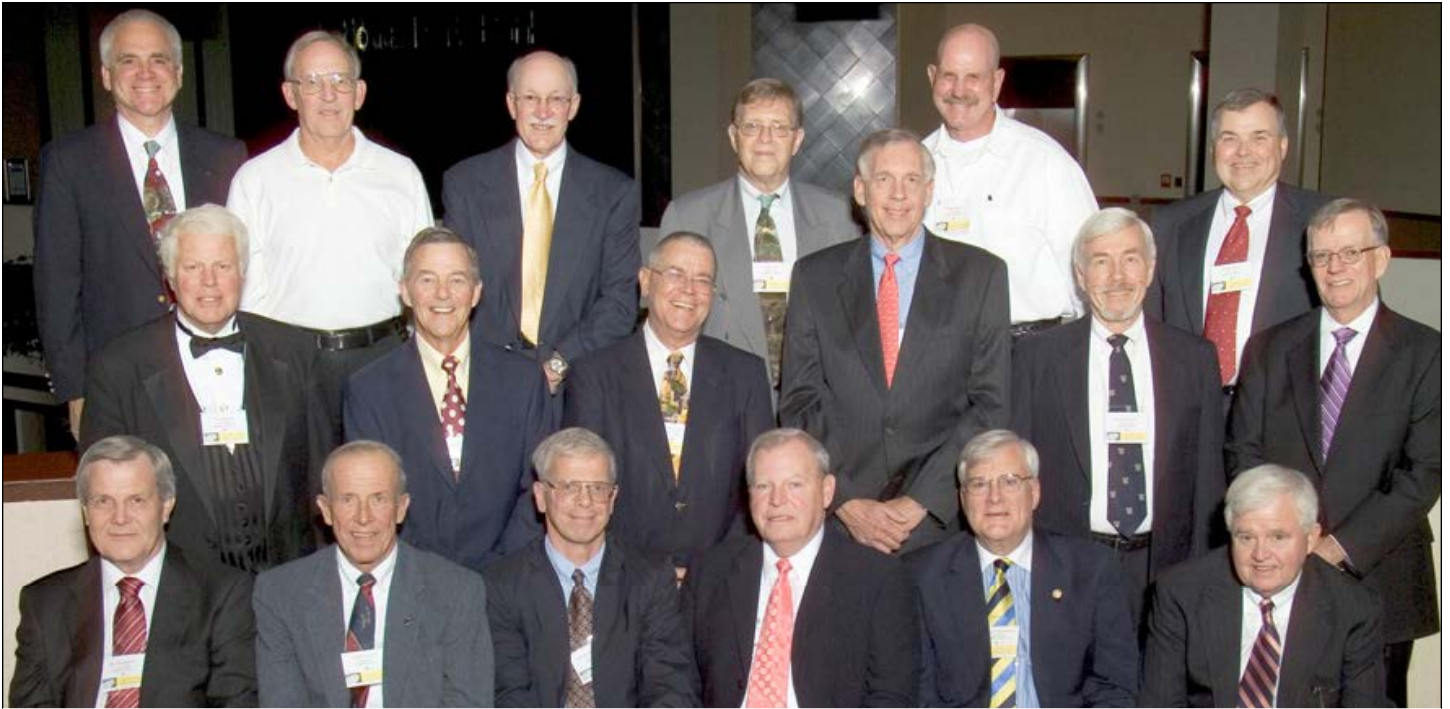

Repairs Help Make Chapter House Secure

So far, 2006 has been another busy year at the Fiji house, with many house and grounds projects being completed and planned. Many of the projects completed to date have been out of necessity, while others have been completed to ready ourselves for 2006 rush and assist with general living comfort.

We also completed our second annual 1960s Project (Work Week), with Fiji alumni returning the second week in June to complete a variety of jobs and to help with the overall house appearance.

Jobs that have been completed in 2006 due to necessity of health or safety issues include: rebuilding the clothes dryer ductwork in basement; replacing three bathroom fans and ductwork; repairing window wells on outside north wall; partially repairing basement ventilation system; repairing a shower leak in second-floor new bathroom; replacing the west stairwell outside door; converting to a new (DePauw-provided) phone system; rebuilding the intercom system; repairing water leaks in the third-floor old bathroom and the kitchen; repairing the electrical system in the new part of building; repairing leaking pipes in the furnace room; repairing holes in the ceiling of the kitchen and the furnace room; and repairing the outside door in north-side stairwell.

Another set of jobs has been completed

to help improve the general appearance of the house and make it more livable. These jobs include: painting the kitchen and serving room; purchasing an additional clothes washer and dryer; replacing the kitchen stove; repairing the ceiling and walls in green room (twice); replacing the carpet in green room; installing an updated Wi-Fi system (many thanks to undergraduate, Drew Hadley '09); purchasing new shelving for the kitchen and storage room; repairing and reupholstering the living room furniture (including two couches, an easy chair, four of the seven desk chairs, four high-back chairs and the piano bench); installing new curtains in the green room and front hallway; and installing electrical outlets in the phone/mail room.

The most significant house improvement occurred when Bill Graham '62 donated and shipped carpeting to the Fiji House this summer. As a result of the donation, we were able to completely recarpet the brotherhood room and second- and third-floor hallways! Many thanks to Bill for the much-needed donation.

June 11-14 marked the dates for our second-annual '60s Project. Spearheaded by the '62 class, we accomplished a number of jobs that were both necessary and cosmetic. The following list represents many of the jobs completed: painting the

first-floor hallway; repairing ceiling lights in serving room; repairing lights and outlets in brotherhood room and several bathrooms; repairing lights in formal room; replacing lights in front hall sitting area; rehanging fire extinguishers and fire alarms; removing old furniture from kitchen and storage room; rebuilding the stairwell and bathroom doors; repairing the outside storage shed door; and reinstalling the brotherhood room door.

Many thanks to Bill Graham '62, Tod Dawson '62, Kit Lortz '62, Carl Sahlberg, Joe Hirtzer '63, and Dave Gilbert '65 for helping during the week. We are planning another '60s Project in 2007, so watch for the announcement and please make arrangements to attend. We'll have a great time and come away with a good feeling of accomplishment.

Despite the many completed jobs listed above, we still have a long way to go with house improvements. We cannot complete all of these jobs due to current budgetary restraints, but we keep the list going in hopes that we can knock some of these off in the weeks to come. Our biggest concern is that we are always subject to "emergency jobs" due to the age of the house and have to maintain a monetary reserve for these issues. At any rate, here's a partial list along with current cost estimates in somewhat of a priority sequence: paint six to eight doors, not estimated yet; painting the dining room, \$1,000; replacing the ceiling in chapter room, \$6,000; repainting stairwells, \$12,000; repairing the concrete owl emblem and mount over front door, not estimated yet (Bruce Allen '59 has offered to help with this expense); purchasing new furniture for the living room, \$8,000-\$10,000; purchasing a new pool table for the brotherhood room, \$2,000-\$4,000; building a new laundry room, \$19,000; replacing the grand piano in living room, \$15,000-\$20,000; and redecorating the bum room, not estimated yet.
