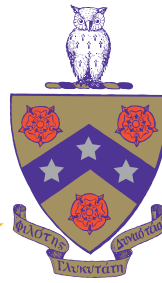

The Lambda chapter house is preparing for the final push to unify its property and enhance its curb appeal.

The message is simple: we need the graduate brothers' classes—especially those between 1970 and 1999—to help!

Although we've gotten some very meaningful donations from members of these classes, our current receipts for each of these decades is the following:

- 1970s: \$87,605 (aside from one major gift)
- 1980s: \$54,529
- 1990s: \$9,765

This is a \$300,000 effort, which is a little more than a quarter of the total contributions already raised by the other classes

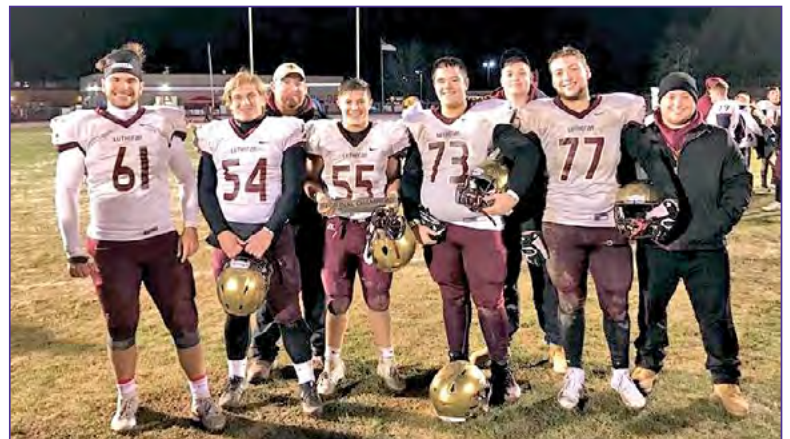
Football is a Family Affair for John Pasch '21

The FIJI House Corporation has been working on several smaller improvements and fixes to the house while we continue to work on the larger capital campaign items.

Items that have just been completed are:

- Replaced all FIJI-owned clothes washers and dryers with rental units.
- Replaced garbage disposal.
- Repaired bathroom drain problem.
- Installed new door security badge readers.

In addition, we are working on plans to:

- Repair roof gutter problems over the front porch.
- Replace missing roof soffit panel.
- Close Pine Street to all traffic.
- Add small landscaping features around the new FIJI patio.
- Relocate FIJI parking spaces currently along Pine Street.

In the 2018-2019 school year, we will have a limited budget for any major improvements and repairs that are not already included in the capital campaign budget.

We are hoping that having just completed the renovation of floors one through three will reduce the usual number of repair items we have experienced in past years.

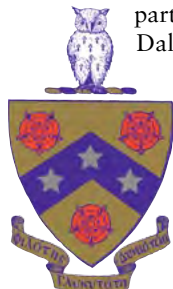
