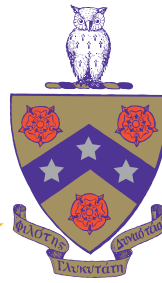

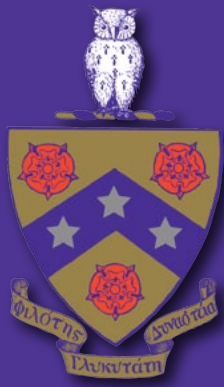

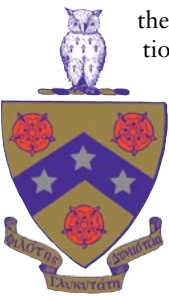

We have clients we’ve provided uninterrupted support to for over 38 years.” He continues, “We have grown with each new presentation and production technology as it came into the market. Our clients continued to push us to provide more and more services. Today, we are leader in providing more than just video. We now own some of the finest audio equipment, including large arrays and encrypted wireless technology. Our stage lighting has evolved to be all LED, including moving computer controlled instruments. Our HD video projection equipment has evolved to 5,000 ANSI HD projectors for breakout rooms up to 20,000 ANSI HD projects for use at the Kennedy Center and for large-screen presentations. Our HD inventory includes 18 Christie DLP HD projectors and 38 AV Stumpfl projection screens. Our HD camera inventory includes eight HD cameras and two 4K interview cameras. We have two warehouses and three large trucks to service events across the country.” Last September the company rebranded as CVW Event Productions to reflect that it is now a full-service presentation and staging company servicing associations, not-for-profits, businesses, and corporations with their annual meetings, expositions, corporate presentations, meetings, special events, and traditional video production.
